- Aspects of this image
 - Distant image
 - Requires magnification of image
 - Shallow depth of field
 - Low noise in sky
- To develop your technique go to a zoo or wildlife park, lot easier that try to learn in the frozen wilderness!

How do I take this style of photo with a compact camera?

- Raid the piggy bank
- Need some camera controls.....
- Select a non auto mode
- Set a wide aperture
- Balance ISO and shutter speed to optimise camera shake and noise
- Use a non multi area focus setting. If this is centre weighted be prepared to crop
- Exposure setting not so critical, probably should follow the focus setting
- Posh cameras within reason you can chose your desired aperture and shutter speed and let auto ISO take care of exposure (with a max speed selected) a max auto ISO setting

With this bright sunshine I'm having problems with reflections, especially on silver or metallic finished surfaces, how do I reduce these?

- Highlights can be improve but many light sources and direct reflections of the sun etc may be too great for any solution.
- We await a demonstration of Jim's handkerchief technique.
- Beware just making them a nasty uniform grey by pulling back the expose in a completely blow highlight, JPG or RAW



Any Questions?

- Take from a different viewpoint
- Photographic Dulling Spray small objects
- Move the subject to shade
- Create share by diffusing the light with a translucent photographic reflector
- Use a polarising filter remembering Brewster's Critical Angle for optimum results
- Use RAW files, maybe and recover the shadows
- Use HDR techniques





The issue I have in rubbish weather is how to improve the sky?

- Applicable to many types of photography.
- Solutions depend on amount of structure in the sky.
- A dull cloudy sky with some texture may be improved in camera or during editing.
- A uniform grey or milky sky needs to be replaced.
- As in the reflections question avoid uniform greys from pulling back blown highlights in clouds.

Any Questions?

- In camera
 - Try a graduated filter.
 - Try a polarising filter
 - Try exposing for sky and recover shadows
- In editing try "Dehaze" type function to emphasise marginal skies but watch the false blue it creates.
- Use a grad control to reduce highlights in the sky
- In Photoshop first try the "David P Method" see image on left
 - Add a suitable sky as another layer
 - Use the Darken Colour bending layer
 - Crop and adjust the sky to look right
 - Tidy up image e.g. recover top of windsock and wing and grey splodge to left of windsock where the new sky is lighter the old.
- If that easy fix doesn't work for you then try adding a selection stage
 - Select the sky
 - Try extending the selection one or two pixels
 - Delete the selection
 - Add a suitable sky as another layer
 - Crop and adjust the sky to look right
 - Use the Darken Colour bending layer
- Keep a selection of cloudy skies on file so they look right and don't repeat in each photo.

- Raid the piggy bank
- Maybe use Burst Mode but consider your buffer depth and saving time
- Very few cameras allow you to do anything useful whilst saving images
- Some cameras have a pre and post facility when the shutter is half depressed
- Some cameras allow selection of images from 4Kand 6k video stream. This will probably become the a very widely used technique so check out:

- To ensure you don't cut things out try shooting with slightly wider angle lens setting to allow quick recomposure between shots
- Set autofocus to continuous mode and experiment with multi point, centre and focus tracking modes if you have them
