#### How Mighty?

- In 1991 Turnover \$19 billion, net worth \$24 billion, 16<sup>th</sup> largest company in USA.
- As late as 2001 "Kodak" was 5th most valuable brand in the world.
- At peak in 1988 Eastman Kodak employed 145,300 people world-wide...
- ...one of whom was...

#### What Went Wrong?

- Lots of simplistic analyses EK failed to make the move to digital.
- The digital world requires a completely different business model.
- The old business model (low margin cameras, high margin film) was ingrained in the EK culture.
- Strategic mistakes going back to the 70 80s
- A number of cultural encumbrances





### Strategic Mistakes


- Instant Photography debacle

- Sterling Drug acquisition





A Brief History of Film size, Camera size and Profitability


























## History of the Disc Project

- 1975 Concept (including image size validation)
- 1982 Product Launch
- Appalling picture quality, poor support from photofinishers, competition from 35mm compacts.
- Brought forward emulsion developments
- Specified special 6 element lens for disc negative printers
- 1988 Stopped camera manufacture
- 1999 Ceased film production




### Where did it go wrong

- Only a few people could do the validation
- "Emulsion Confidential" rules meant calculations not crosschecked and not published
- Subsequently discovered a major mathematical error
- Brought forward emulsion developments
- Specified special 6 element lens for disc negative printers



### What might have happened?

- Disc project cancelled early, say, 1977
- Gone back to the drawing board
- APS product introduced in 1984 (instead of 1994)
- Would have competed better against 35mm
- Might have provided a smoother transition to digital







#### Cultural Encumbrances

- Distrust of Patents (also relevant to the Instant fiasco)
- Reliance on secrecy (and the impact on senior management selection)
- Insistence on proprietary product design
- Reluctance to say No to senior managers
- Slow and bureaucratic management processes
- Mormon mindset?



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
