From the U3A website:

U3A stands for the University of the Third Age, which is a self-help organisation for people no longer in full time employment providing educational, creative and leisure opportunities in a friendly environment. It consists of local U3As all over the UK, which are charities in their own right and are run entirely by volunteers.

By extension, therefore, most U3A members are over 60, and may suffer from medical or mobility problems.

Access to Rickmansworth Sailing Club is by means of an unmetalled track, over a narrow bridge which crosses a weir, with parking in a field outside the gates of the Sailing Club which has an unfenced stream running alongside. The track and field can be muddy and slippery during and after wet weather. 2.	Moving about within the grounds of the Sailing Club. There are lots of dinghies and trailers parked on the hardstanding beside the water, and there are dinghies under repair in the boatshed. There are also steps, mooring loops, building works and other trip hazards. Risk of damage to dinghies and risk of injury to persons.	Low	Low	Low	Members of the U3A are advised to take care when moving about near the parked dinghies or when retrieving equipment from the boatshed. When carrying booms, masts and other bulky pieces of equipment, members of the U3A should ensure they do not damage parked dinghies or injure other people or themselves.	RSC insist that their members who berth dinghies at the club should have £3 million public liability insurance. Club boats used by the Group are covered by RSC insurance against material damage and public liability. 3 <sup>rd</sup> Age Trust Insurance covers damage to any U3A material and third party liability but not members' personal injury. 3.	Launching boats: Access to the lake is via ramps, steps and three floating pontoons. Risk of falling on the ramps and pontoons, risk of falling in the lake. The pontoons can become slippery during and after wet weather and can be covered in bird droppings.  Boats should only be launched or recovered when sufficient people are available to do this safely. 6.	Condition of water: Weil's Disease, Leptospirosis or Blue Green Algae. Risk of contracting disease	Low	Low	Low	Members of the U3A should be made aware that there is a low risk of contracting Weil's Disease or Leptospirosis which is a disease caused by organisms in animal droppings, particularly the urine of rats. It is caught through skin abrasions and cuts or through the eyes, nose or mouth. Existing cuts and grazes should therefore be covered with waterproof sticking plaster.  Blue green algae is rarely a problem but can be toxic.  Members of the U3A should shower after sailing, and consult their doctor if any symptoms typical of either of the above conditions appear. The patrol boat should be manned by at least two people, one of whom should have attended an appropriate patrol boat course and have been approved by RSC. The boat should be equipped with a sealed safety box and a fire extinguisher. The kill cord should be used at all times. The helmsman is responsible for the boat and the crew. He or she should know which boat has right of way but should avoid colliding with other boats.  The helmsman should also be aware of potential hazards on the lake such as shallows, overhanging trees, weed and buoys.  More experienced members helm for less experienced crews and intervene if necessary when less experienced members are at the helm.	RSC insurance covers damage to boats owned by the Club (not by individual members) but does not cover personal injury. #### **Dealing with a Major Incident**

A 'major incident' is one in which an accident or other incident has happened which has involved the emergency services (Fire, Police or Ambulance) and is serious enough such that the press or other news media might take an interest. Assuming that any immediate danger has been resolved then the OOD should contact the Commodore or Vice Commodore who will implement the RSC's Major Incident Plan.

NB: do not speak to the press or other media
